Unlocking EEOICP Benefits:

5 Essential Tips for Nuclear and Uranium Workers

If you're a nuclear weapons or uranium worker with a U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) medical benefits white card – or will soon receive one – do you know how to make the most of your card from day one?

Nuclear weapons and uranium workers who have a U.S. DOL medical benefits white card may not know all the benefits their card entitles them to receive. Many are aware of the compensation and free healthcare benefits offered by the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program (EEOICP). Did you know that EEOICP benefits are retroactive to the date of application?

That means EEOICP benefits apply from the date a worker files their claim to the date they receive approval. For example, if a worker files an EEOICP claim for a respiratory illness and needs to purchase medications or equipment for that illness while waiting for approval, costs incurred between filing the claim and receiving approval can be reimbursed.



If you have a U.S. DOL medical benefits white card or recently received your approval, check out the following actions you can take to make the most of your EEOICP benefits:



1. Get Reimbursed - Gather receipts of expenses related to covered conditions from the date of filing the claim. Talk to a local Cold War Patriots (CWP) team member for next steps on reimbursement.



2. Locate a Provider - Ask your local CWP representative or Professional Case Management (PCM) care team to help find a local provider who accepts the card. A PCM care team can help you coordinate your care and appointment schedules.



3. Get Compensated - Schedule an impairment evaluation with [PCM Impairments](#) to determine financial compensation for the permanent loss of function of a body part or organ due to a covered illness. For each 1% of impairment, \$2,500 is awarded, up to a maximum of \$250,000.



4. Customize Care - Call a local CWP representative or PCM care team member to schedule an in-home visit to discuss safety at home, [how PCM care can support wellness goals](#) and help you maintain your lifestyle.



5. Keep Learning - Attend an [in-person or virtual CWP event](#) to learn from EEOICP benefits experts how to best utilize your card and benefits to maintain your independence over time.

Doing these steps helps workers with a U.S. DOL medical benefits white card enjoy all the EEOICP benefits they earned through their work in the nuclear weapons and uranium industries.

Floyd Kept the Savannah River Site Powered and Prepared, Now PCM Care Helps Him Recharge

My name is Floyd, and I worked at the Savannah River Site as a shift supervisor in the Power Department.

The Power Department had numerous responsibilities. We operated boilers and powerhouses that provided steam for heating and some processing in all the buildings and the plant. We also supplied domestic water to all the buildings and managed wastewater treatment plants, which required state licenses to operate. The Power Department maintained emergency diesel generators and conducted weekly surveys of some buildings to ensure readiness in case of an emergency. If the Savannah River Site lost power, our emergency generators would activate and supply power to the buildings.

Although we needed various clearances, such as Q clearance or secret weapons data clearance, the site's operations were not entirely clear to us. The Savannah River Site had canyon buildings where plutonium and uranium were processed, but we didn't know all the details of their activities due to security reasons. It was a very interesting job with significant responsibilities.

As a Professional Case Management (PCM) client, it is very nice to have a community to be a part of, and I have enjoyed being with PCM for so long. They have taken excellent care of me. PCM helped me obtain 24-hour nursing care, which has been a blessing. I have some very good nurses with me around the clock, and we get along really well. 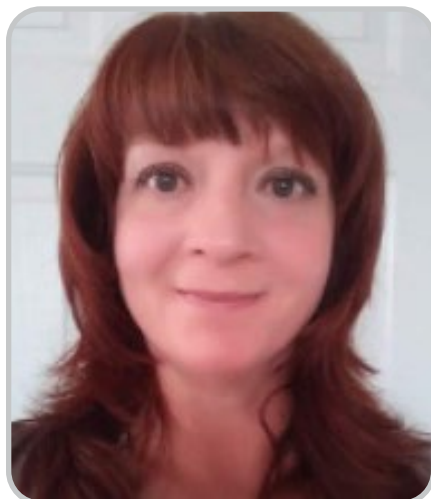
